#### THE AMBULANCE SERVICE - TALK AT THE SIDLESHAM MEMORIAL HALL

This was the first of a series of talks organised by the SCA, following the BBC, to "inform, educate and entertain". Grace Howard of South East Coast Ambulance Service gave a brief history of our ambulance services. Starting from voluntary and charitable organisations such as the St. John's Ambulance Brigade which solely ferried people to and from local hospitals, we were brought up-to-date with our modern highly professional state-financed service which can do so much more than a simple taxi service. The nearer in time to an emergency that appropriate action can be taken raises the chances of successful intervention, and ambulance crews can now perform many life-saving procedures on site. We learnt that why we call '999'. It is because, on the old telephone, the '9' was the hole one up from the '0'. Thus, it could be easily identified in the dark by feel. Emergency calls go through a triage system at a centralised call centre. The decision is then transmitted to the local service. However, priorities can change whilst an

ambulance is *en route*, and it can be redirected. Since they are the ones on site, ambulance crews make importance decisions, though, for most situations, protocols have been developed to assist them based upon prior experiences. In a very relaxed interactive style, we were told how best to behave when there is an ambulance sounding its siren and flashing blue lights keep to the law, move safely to the side and don't stop opposite

a bollard. This can impede the ambulance's progress. Grace admitted that one of the more satisfying aspects of her job was dealing with end-of-life situations. This not something one might immediately associate with paramedics, as they are now



called. By the time you read this article, Grace may have had her first baby. We thank her for her contribution and wish her well in her new role.

On 6<sup>th</sup> December, following on from the very successful Murder Mystery last April, there will be another Murder Mystery produced by SCATS with a Christmas theme.



Still no sign of Summer and with a perfect mix of rain and sun to ensure land, not so great if you're not a fan of

that the Alstroemeria haven't declined the way I'd have expected. They don't like the heat so by this time they'd normally be much shorter with far fewer numbers. Not that bigger, I'm complaining, as they're one of the very few flowers I can pick standing up and they remain a customer favourite. After six months spending half of every day working on hands and knees my left knee has made it clear that enough's enough. It's held out longer than most years though. Today I'd made a big decision to rename the pinks as it was rather the 'pinks' in July, with the first of the 'garden pinks' to be confusing. What flowers do you have I'd get asked. Pinks I'd picked in the winter. reply. What type of flowers though? Anyway, they're after all just a type of carnation right? Wrong! I did a Google search Aart Dubbeldam and it turns out that whilst they're both Dianthus, they're

actually different species. This was a good time for a renaming too as they're getting pulled out this week, before replanting in a month. Normally they'd be in flower all summer, but I've decided to concede the latest round of the maximum grass growth. Wonderful if ongoing Thrip wars and make a strategic withdrawal. you're a fan of this green and verdant could've taken the nuclear option and blasted them with insecticides, but that would have caused other problems down spending all day every Sunday either the line. #### HOUSES WITH A STORY TO TELL (20)



Several of the houses in Sidlesham date back to the middle of the 18<sup>th</sup> century and appear on maps at the West Sussex Records Office dated 1776. Others, like St.Mary's may date from Tudor times. (Story told in June 2024)

However references to houses in Sidlesham go back even further than Tudor times. Prior to the coastal re-alignment at Medmerry in 2013 Sidlesham had a beach! During the construction the Chichester and District Archaeology Society discovered **a large intertidal fish trap**, It comprised a V- or tick-shaped structure of linear post and wattle alignments with an associated circular post and wattle structure. Its length of at least 225m long, suggests fishing on a commercial scale rather than local villagers. Radiocarbon dating suggest that it was constructed in the **first quarter of the fifteenth century AD**. (Historic England 56/2023)

Earlier, Sidlesham was a settlement mentioned in the Domesday Book, in the hundred of Somerley and the county of Sussex. It had a recorded population of 42 households in **1086**, putting it in the largest 20% of settlements recorded in Domesday. Selsey was also mentioned with 30 households.

Earlier still ..... The site of a *Roman villa* with a bath house was excavated in 1951 on LSA smallholding No 20, near Bird Pond. It dated from the **1st to the 4th century AD**. A ditch containing Iron Age pottery (**1200** – **550** BC) was also found. (Source Historic England: 462211)

And even earlier .....

During the realignment of the coast at Medmerry (2013)

archaeologists found the remains of **5 round house** structures dating back to the Bronze Age (**2500-750 BC**)

An modern day example can be seen at Butser Ancient Farm, near Queen Elizabeth Park, on the A3 (PO8 0BG)
